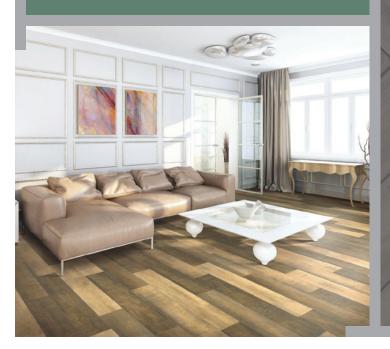

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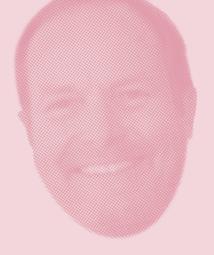


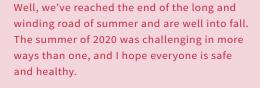






EVERYTHING IS ROSIE

IT'S YOUR COURSE

FAIRWAY DIVOT REPAIR

We take pride in our course, and we hope you do as well. Visitors to our club often comment on the great shape the course is in. Please help us keep it that way by repairing your divots! Below is a step-by-step guide on how to successfully repair a fairway divot so it will take root and continue to grow.



Oops! Divots happen to the best of us



Place the divot back into



Step down on the divot



Pour divot mix around the edges.



Step down on the divot

A properly fixed divot has the best chance to recover and provides a better hitting surface should another ball land on it. Unrepaired divots can go an entire season and not recover.

On the green, fix all your ball marks and make it a habit to fix others that someone may have missed. A properly fixed ball mark on the green will heal in 48 hours!

SOLF TIPS

Clubhead Lag & Body Pivot

So many golfers create a habit of swinging with their arms. Here is a quick reminder of what is important during the golf swing.

There are two distinct ways to think about the golf swing: *hitting the ball* versus *swinging the club*.

Many golfers get trapped by thinking they have to hit the ball, and that mindset can get you into trouble. I challenge you to think more along the lines of swinging the club.

Clubhead lag and body pivot are the golf swing's workhorse.

When you make a divot behind the ball, it is primarily because the clubhead came down too early. The goal is to swing the club and pull the handle. Pulling the handle is the feeling we strive for.

The opposite reaction is when golfers try to push the clubhead down to the ball using an "all arm" approach. The clubhead is heavier than the handle. Your job is to keep the handle moving by using the pivot.

- **⊘** Turning through the impact zone
- ✓ Finishing your swing
- **Good Shot**

And one final helpful tip: use the pivot foot to drive and move the handle as you accelerate through the impact zone.

This year's Masters Tournament has been rescheduled for November 12-15. While we wait to see who will don the famous green jacket, we thought it would be fun to relive some of the incredible moments the tournament has hosted over the years.

Tiger Woods had quite the outing. Not only did he become the youngest Masters champion ever (at age 21 years, 3 months, and 15 days), but his 12-stroke margin of victory was the biggest in the history of the tournament. His record 70-66-65-69 (270) score was 18 under par — one stroke better than the previous record holders, Jack Nicklaus (1965) and Raymond Floyd (1976).

It is well-known that Ben Hogan hated putting, but do you know why? It stemmed partly from his finish in the 1946 Masters. On the 18th hole, he needed only par to tie leader Herman Keiser, who had three-putted the hole. Hogan hit his approach to 20 feet... but he also three-putted, giving Keiser the victory.

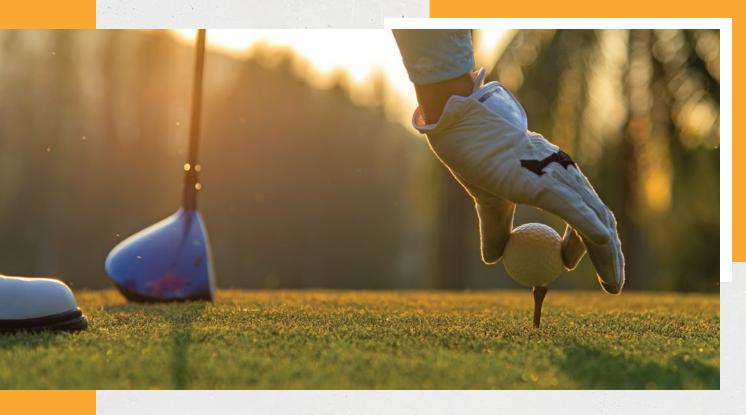

If you'd like to invite new or longtime friends to make Meadia Heights their Home Away from Home as well, we now have three programs available to make it easier for them to join.

"NEW TO THE AREA" PROGRAM

Anyone who moves within a 10-mile radius of Meadia Heights is eligible to receive a one-month, no-commitment Platinum Membership within their first 90 days of residence for \$475.

REFERRAL PROGRAM

Refer any new member to Meadia Heights, and they will receive a one-month, no-commitment Platinum Membership for \$475. If the person then signs on as a Platinum Member for the year, the referring member will receive one month free.

FALL & WINTER FULL GOLF MEMBERSHIP INCENTIVE

Offering no dues for up to six months for those who join between November 1, 2020 and March 1, 2021. At time of registration, \$300 is owed to begin membership, and serves as April 2021 dues. This indicates a one-year commitment starting April 1, 2021. Monthly dues begin May 1, 2021 and are billed at the end of each month. A monthly service fee will not be charged until April 1, 2021. However, an 18% service charge will be applied to bar and dining bills until April 1, 2021.
