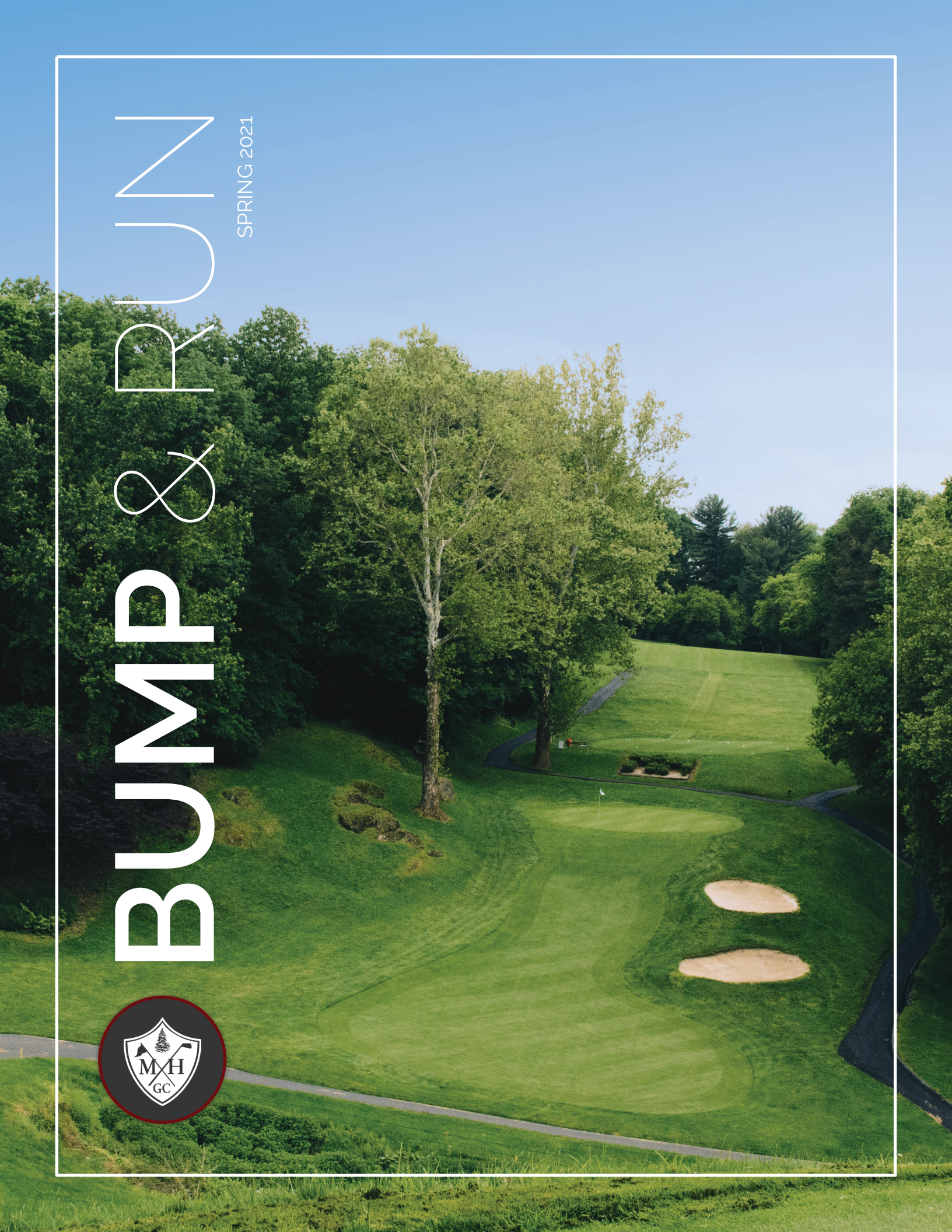




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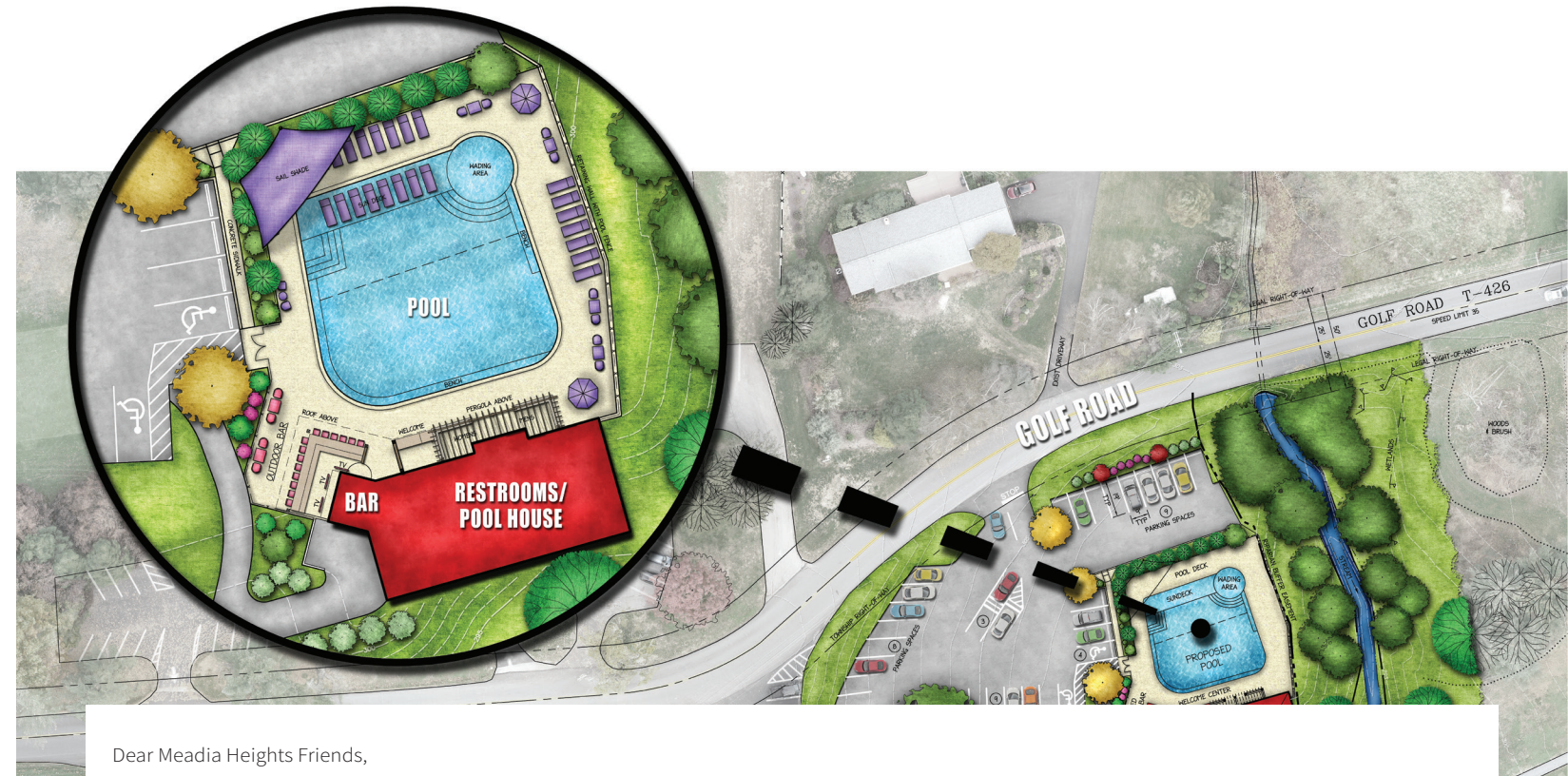

I have purchased several seed packets of the "shooting star," as it is commonly known, and plan to establish a garden to showcase our namesake. I hope that this little project is successful and we all can enjoy these beautiful flowers just as our founders did. I'll keep you updated.

It is my continued hope that all are safe and healthy. I'm looking forward to seeing everyone playing our course and enjoying nice weather this spring.

Featured Drink

PORCH POUNDER

Featuring Sagamore Spirit Rye Whiskey

This issue's featured drink is the Porch Pounder, particularly suitable for enjoying on the porch on a warm spring evening. Hailing from Maryland, Sagamore Spirit rye whiskey forms the base of this cocktail. This unique rye is a blend of two whiskeys, one with a high rye mash bill and the other low. But what also gives it a distinct flavor is the high-quality water used — from the distillery's namesake, Sagamore Farm, a thoroughbred horse racing farm built on a nearby limestone shelf. Sounds like the perfect Mid-Atlantic spirit to enjoy during the Kentucky Derby!

- 1 ½ oz Sagamore Spirit rye whiskey
- ½ oz lime juice
- ¾ oz blackberry simple syrup*
- 3 oz ginger beer
- Mint leaves & blackberries for garnish

1. Shake whiskey, lime juice, blackberry simple syrup, and a few mint leaves with ice.
2. Strain into a collins glass.
3. Top with ginger beer.
4. Garnish with mint sprigs and three skewered blackberries.



*To make blackberry simple syrup: Mix equal parts water, sugar, and blackberries in a pot. Bring to a boil and then reduce to a simmer for 10 minutes. Chill overnight and strain.

Need a quick fix? Simply muddle blackberries with pre-made simple syrup.

Existential philosophy

FORCE AND *POWER*

Every year I get the question “How can I hit the ball longer?”

Many think that if they swing harder, the ball will go farther, but that is not the full answer. Believing that effort is power is one of a golfer’s greatest hazards. No amount of effort can produce more power than a player’s turning speed.

Power and force can be regulated by:

- Rate of rotation
- Size of the swing’s radius
- Length of stroke
- Where the release occurs

The power package (shoulder, arms, hands, wrists) develops power and force through sound alignments and effective pivot thrust. The hands hold on and attach the arms to the club for control and clubface alignment, as pivot thrust drives these components through impact. By themselves, the arms and hands can move the ball only a short distance. (The less we use the biceps, the better off we will be.)

For more distance, the shoulders and hips can generate power by applying rotation. The longer the wrist cock is retained, the greater the velocity and force can be at impact. A sound swing retains wrist cock longer than an unsound one.

I hope this helps get you started on a path to longer shots and more birdies.

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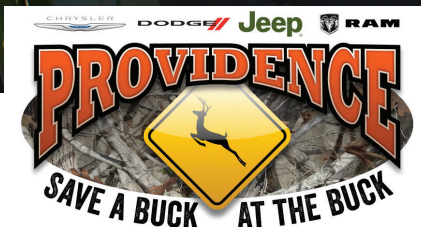
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
